Amazingly, they are all the accomplishments of one young dynamo, Jordan Wirsz. Now just 18, he is an excellent student, holds down a job at Ocala Aviation Services, Inc. at Ocala International Airport, does some free-lance commercial flying, and runs his innovative aviation sales business. And he's a really nice guy besides!

Wirsz says it all started when he was four. That's when "I figured out what an airplane and a helicopter were. I begged my mother, time after time, to take me to fly. Finally, she gave in, and took me to the local airport at Redlands, Calif. I watched the airplanes with an ever-widening grin that still grows today. I talked to pilots, made airplane noises and spread my arms just like most other kids." He finally got his first ride, in the back seat of a

Throughout his training, both of his parents were very supportive of his passion. He soloed at 16, then
